BRUCKNER: Symphony 9 - Lecture and Final Fragment Vienna Philharmonic / Nikolaus Harnoncourt RCA 65433 (2 CD) Hybrid multi-channel SACD - 131 minutes

BRUCKNER: Symphony 9 (with reconstructed Finale) Westphalia Philharmonic / Johannes Wildner Naxos 555933 (2 CD) -83 minutes

Until these discs appeared, I was unaware that Bruckner had nearly completely the final movement of his Ninth Symphony. Tradition has dictated that this symphony be performed as a three movement work and according to the extensive notes provided by both discs, this did not appear to be the wish of the composer. Shortly before Bruckner's death in 1896, the terminally ill composer informed his friends, that if he should die before completing the symphony, his Te Deum should be used as the Finale. It has been estimated that had Bruckner lived one more month, he would have completed the final movement. Instead upon

his death, many of the pages of the manuscripts were either given to friends or admirers of the composer or well sold outright. His request that the Te Deum be used as the symphony's finale were simply ignored and what had been written was forgotten. Current scholarship has changed the situation.

Johannes Wildner and the Westphalia Philharmonic give us a more than competent performance of what most of us regard as the Ninth Symphony, that is the first three movements of the symphony. However, since I have acquired this disc in early December, I have listened to the Finale at least a half dozen times. This is the thrill of discovering new music by a master This disc is a no brainer for all lovers of Bruckner's music. The recording is decent but unspectacular. A very good introduction to this music.

Nikolaus Harnoncourt and the Vienna Philharmonic give us a first class performance of the first three movements of the symphony. This is the first RCA SACD, and the sound is spectacular. Even without the second disc this performance would get a positive recommendation. The Naxos gives us the reconstructed Finale, RCA gives us the completed fragments, about 565 measures, and a lecture by Harnoncourt on the uncompleted Finale. This disc is a conventional CD, but compared to the Naxos, one could say that there is no comparison. The RCA is much better in all aspects. One could only imagine what the reconstructed Finale might have sounded like with these forces. Highly recommended.
