The speakers are 97db efficient and use a Lambda 15" bass driver with an ESS Heil Air Motion transducer in a series crossover in a sand-fillable cylindrical enclosure. ### NOVEMBER MEETING RECAP

Gregg Straley demonstrated Stan Warren's standing bass wave correction concept with a very inexpensive subwoofer. There was an audio tape from Stan explaining his design concepts on both the corrective subwoofer, as well as his amp and preamp designs that are due to release next year. Gregg brought his Reimer Wind River GS Loudspeakers, Stan Warren Buffered Line Stage, Stan Warren Folded-Cascode Amp, and Stan Warren modified GCD-750 CD player, as well as Gregg's own cables. Stan was unable to supply the prototype unit, but the inexpensive sub connected out-of-phase at the rear of the listening area at ear level was able to give about half the effect. Most agreed that the sub made a positive contribution to the music, adding a sense of soundstage and bass foundation, as long as one was seated roughly midway left to right, and front to back.

Thanks to Gregg for "channelling" Stan to us (those of you who heard the audio tape know what I mean!) and an enjoyable presentation.

Also, a big thank you to Joe Lavrencik who had an Open House at his home for members on Saturday, November 20th, featuring his Martin Logan reQuest speakers, with Joule Electra electronics and Great Northern Sound modified Wadia player, as well as Joe's own design-Critical Mass Systems isolation platforms.

### CLASSICAL CORNER by Len Cronin

The best part about compiling a Want-List is that one can select his or her personal favorites strictly based on one's musical taste.

Cedelle Records has given us a collection of the orchestral music of Robert Kurka. Best known for his opera The Good Soldier Schweik this recording of his Second Symphony and other shorter works can only make you wonder what might have been, if he had lived past his thirty-fifth birthday.

Jeninifer Higdon is one of the up and coming composers of her generation. She has been described as a modern American populist but don't expect Copland. Rather her music is more in tune with that of Michael Torke but on a larger scale both emotionally and musically.

If you do not own any of the music of David Diamond then this is the place to start. Naxos has reissued Second and Fourth Symphonies from the old Delos series from the early nineties. The Second Symphony is one of my favorite symphonies and deserves to be more well known than it is.

The last two selections are also on Naxos and feature the music of Dmitry Shostakovich.

This is the first complete recording of the 1964 film score of Hamlet. This is the way music for the movies should sound like. The other cd is that of the Seventh Symphony, THe Leningrad. This is a direct and forceful rendition of the symphony that makes a nice tonic to the slower approach favored by many conductors.
